

## *The Salzburg Seminar*

- 1.1 Since 1947 the Salzburg Seminar has provided an international forum for young intellectuals committed to making a difference in their professions and in their societies. The one-week sessions at *Schloß Leopoldskron* in Salzburg bring together between 50 and 60 participants under the leadership of distinguished faculty members, who are internationally renowned specialists in their fields. The topics discussed are related to politics, economics, business, law, science, education and the arts.
- 1.2 **Information for applicants.** The Seminar seeks the participation of women and men of all nationalities and political persuasions. Preference is given to applicants between the ages of 30 and 45, although appropriate applicants of any age can be admitted. They must demonstrate professional experience in and knowledge of the subject of the session. All sessions are conducted in English. Admission is competitive.

- 1.3 **Costs of attendance.** The Seminar may offer up to 75% tuition waivers to 2 or 3 EUI research students per annum. The EUI, subject to available funding, covers travel costs (Florence-Salzburg-Florence) according to standard EUI mission reimbursements, and 25% of the seminar tuition costs.
- 1.4 Interested students should contact Ken Hulley of Academic Service in good time to prepare the application. Salzburg Seminar must have received the application **three months before** the start of the session)

Copies of all online applications *must* be forwarded – ***without any exception*** – to Academic Service. Under the special arrangement direct online application will be accepted by the Salzburg Seminar, but this has to be backed up simultaneously by support letters from Academic Service, the researcher's supervisor and department.

The normal duration of a visit to Salzburg Seminar is approximately one week. Researchers accepted must therefore request the department's permission to be absent.
