

Curriculum Vitae Ellen M. Immergut

Ellen M. Immergut is on leave from her position as Professor of Comparative Politics in the Department of Political and Social Sciences at Humboldt University Berlin, where she has taught since 2002. Previously, she was Professor of Political Theory at the Department of Politics and Management at the University of Konstanz, Ford International Career Development Chair and Associate Professor of Public Policy in the Department of Political Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, as well as Assistant Professor and Lecturer at MIT, and Junior Tutor in the Committee for Degrees on Social Studies at Harvard University. She has been Visiting Professor or Visiting Scholar at the *Collegio Carlo Alberto* Turin, Georgetown University's BMW Center for German and European Studies, the *Instituto Juan March de Estudios e Investigaciones* Madrid, the Institute for Sociological Studies at Charles University Prague, the *Institut für vergleichende Gesellschaftsforschung* at the *Wissenschaftszentrum Berlin* and the *Max-Planck-Institut für Gesellschaftsforschung* Cologne.

Immergut received her BA, MA and PhD from Harvard University, as well as studying at the University of Stockholm and the Ecole Normale Supérieure de Jeunes Filles Paris. She has received Fellowships from the Social Science Research Council, the *Hanse Wissenschaftskolleg*, the National Science Foundation, the German Marshall Fund of the United States, and was a Fulbright Scholar of the United States Senate. Immergut is currently the Scientific Programme Coordinator of the NORFACE Welfare State Futures Programme, and Director of the Humboldt University Doctoral Program on "Health and Welfare in the 21st Century," as well as former Director of the Berlin Graduate School of Social Sciences (BGSS).
