### 10.00 World Café discussion: The challenges ahead

Chair: Claudine Provencher (Teaching and Learning Centre, LSE)

Using the World Café methodology, we will have a conversation about the following three questions:

- o What are the key challenges that early career scholars will be facing by 2026?
- What could help them to address these challenges?
- How could the FIESOLE Group help address these challenges?

This conversation will be modelled after the idea of a café, with five or six participants seating around tables, equipped with flip charts and coloured pens. After a small introduction to explain the process and setting the context, there will be three 20-minute rounds of conversation during which each table will discuss the three questions in turn, writing down their thoughts on the flip charts provided. At the end of each 20-minute period, the members of each table, minus one 'table host', will move to another table and start working on the next question using the thinking done by the previous group at that table.

At the end of these three rounds, participants will be invited to share their insights with the group as a whole, thus identifying key training challenges in today's global academia and producing suggestions and recommendations for how the FIESOLE Group could best position itself to ensure its relevance until 2026 and beyond.

The FIESOLE Group came into being hand in hand with the opening of the Max Weber Programme in September 2006, when a group of applied linguists, educationalists and language professionals from various higher education institutions in Europe met to brainstorm ideas about how to give concrete support to the first cohort of Max Weber Fellows. Since then, the focus of the Group's activities has widened to include a concern with developing and disseminating best practices in the field of academic communication, with particular reference to the needs of doctoral and post-doctoral researchers and junior faculty in today's multilingual Europe.

In addition to the members of the EUI Unit for English for Academic Communication and Professional Development, members of the group include faculty and language professionals from the London School of Economics and Institute of Education (University of London), Humboldt University (Berlin), Collège d'Europe (Bruges), University of Siena, Pompeu Fabra University (Barcelona), Oxford Learning Institute (University of Oxford), the Central European University (Budapest) and University of Copenhagen.
