Resurgent Nationalism? Local Peacebuilding and the Future of Ethnopolitics in the 21st century

By Professor Neophytos Loizides

Neophytos Loizides is a Professor of International Conflict Analysis at the University of Kent, UK. Professor Loizides researches new understandings of ethnonational conflicts and political institution-building within violently divided societies, specifically investigating how power-sharing and reconciliation mechanisms could help mitigate such conflicts. Professor Loizides is the author of *The Politics of Majority Nationalism: Framing Peace, Stalemates, and Crises* published by Stanford University Press (2015) and *Designing Peace: Cyprus and Institutional Innovations in Divided Societies* published by the University of Pennsylvania Press (2016). He is also the co-editor (with Oded Haklai) of *Settlers in Contested Lands: Territorial Disputes and Ethnic Conflicts* and has authored more than thirty academic articles and book chapters in the areas of nationalism, forced displacement and conflict regulation in deeply divided societies, including most recent works published in the *European Journal of Political Research*, the *International Journal of Constitutional Law, Comparative Politics* and the *Journal of Refugee Studies*.
