The European integration primary objective was to secure peace in Europe. This policy was extended after the end of the Cold War through new instruments, namely the enlargement policy and the association process. It helped to stabilise the newly democratised Central European states through a policy of conditionality and financial and technical aid, safeguarding the transformation. This policy failed in the Eastern Partnership countries due to the external pressure from Russia, the relative lack of interest from the strongest Member States and a high degree of heteronormativity among EU's neighbours themselves.
