EP Visiting Fellow scheme

The European Parliament's Visiting Fellowship scheme promotes links between senior academics and think-tankers, on the one hand, and EP staff engaged in research and policy-related work, on the other. Located within a wider pattern of EP collaboration with major universities and think tanks, the scheme offers leading academics and researchers the opportunity to undertake jointly-agreed research within and with the Parliament.

Visiting Fellows contribute intellectually to the work of, and actively engage with, EP staff members on a daily basis. They give lectures, seminars or talks and discuss or contribute to and/or peer review draft reports and papers.

Visiting Fellows are established senior academics or think tankers of recognised distinction in the field of EU studies, usually on sabbatical leave from their employers. They pursue an agreed topic of research of relevance to the Parliament, on the Parliament's premises, for a period of between six and twelve months. They give several substantive seminars or talks on their research topic (and/or other mutually agreed topics) and one lecture during their period of attachment to the Parliament. They also engage in a process of broader intellectual exchange with policy analysts and administrators, promoted by a designated mentor at head of unit or director level within the Parliament's administration. Candidates for Visiting Fellowships may apply for limited financial support if their full salary is not being fully met by their employer.

EP Visiting Scholar scheme

The European Parliament's Visiting Scholarship scheme promotes links between academics and think-tankers, on the one hand, and EP staff engaged in research and policy-related work, on the other. Located within a wider pattern of EP collaboration with major universities and think tanks, the scheme offers emerging academics and researchers the opportunity to undertake jointly-agreed research within and with the Parliament.

Visiting Scholars contribute intellectually to the work of, and actively engage with, EP staff members on a daily basis. They give seminars or talks and discuss or contribute to and/or peer review draft reports and papers.

Visiting Scholars are usually early-stage to mid-career academics or think tankers taking time out of their usual work and who come with their own funds. They pursue an agreed topic of research of relevance to the Parliament, on the Parliament's premises, for a period of between two and twelve months. They give at least one substantive seminar or talk on their research topic during their period of attachment to the Parliament, and engage in a process of broader intellectual exchange with policy analysts and administrators, promoted by a designated mentor within the Parliament's administration.
