<b>Job description:</b>	<p>On December 19, 2018, the U.N. General Assembly officially endorsed the Global Compact for Migration (GCM), a non-binding agreement approved in a historical moment in Marrakech on 10 December by 164 Member States. The GCM is the first time in which the international community has widely agreed on how to address the global migration challenge. The topic of citizenship, however, has been left outside of the GCM and remains the last stronghold of national sovereignty, which, so the argument goes, needs no international regulation. Is this assumption still politically valid, or is the world ready for a Global Compact on Citizenship?</p> <p>The “<a href="#">Global Citizenship Governance</a>” Project, jointly hosted by the Robert Schuman Centre for Advanced Studies and the WZB Berlin Social Science Center, is seeking to appoint a researcher in the field of “<b>Global Compact on Citizenship</b>” (GCC). The research will examine the idea of a GCC from different perspectives: for example, history, public international law, political theory, or IR.</p>
