Project details

The aim of the project is to produce a report on the 'State of Play of research on contemporary antisemitism and Jewish life in the EU'. The report should include a mapping of the state of play and based on the findings, put forward policy recommendations on how to build a comprehensive research hub on contemporary antisemitism and Jewish life in the EU'.

Job description

The research fellow will carry out research work in an independent manner and collaborate on the research work of the project.

- Carrying out research on existing chairs and research centres on contemporary antisemitism and Jewish life in the EU; identifying these chairs and centres, analysing how they are connected and how they related also to chairs and centres located outside the EU;
- Analysing the research carried out by these centres, identifying existing (if any) shortcomings in terms of research and in terms of geographical coverage in EU countries;
- Preparing a draft report on the basis of these findings to be presented at a workshop in May/June 2022;
- Drafting policy recommendations in collaboration with Prof Schüler-Springorum, Center for Research on Anti-Semitism, TU Berlin, taking into account the results of the workshop;
- Finalising the report which should include the results of the mapping exercise, conclusions and policy recommendations.
