### Project details

**PRIME, funded by HorizonEurope, April 2023 – March 2026**

PRIME is a new international research and policy project that will provide a new comparative institutional approach to understanding the conditions and vulnerabilities of irregular migrants in Europe. Understanding ‘irregularity’ as a complex, gendered status it will conduct large-scale surveys, structured policy analysis, and qualitative interviews with irregular migrants, employers, policy actors, interest groups and voters across eight European countries. PRIME will examine the inevitable goal conflicts that arise in policy-making toward irregular migrants, and propose strategies for how they may be best managed across different institutional settings to enable more effective policy-making that benefits both migrants and host communities.

Led by the MPC, the PRIME consortium will include six other research institutions across Europe. It will conduct interviews and surveys in Austria, Croatia, Greece, Italy, Poland, Spain, Sweden, and the UK, covering migrant workers employed in four sectors (agriculture and food processing, social care, waste management, and restaurants). PRIME’s analyses will be multi-disciplinary, drawing on economics, politics, law, sociology, and political philosophy.

### Job description

The Research Fellow will carry out research work in an independent manner and collaborate on the research work of the project, with focus on the rights of (irregular) migrant workers in Europe and, more broadly, in comparative institutional approaches to the analysis of social and public policies. Main tasks include:

- Co-authoring a theoretical paper on the institutional context of the conditions of irregular migrants in Europe;
- Leading and co-authoring a paper with comparative legal analyses of irregular migrants’ access to social and labour protections across EU Member States;
- Contributing to the development of the methodological approach to PRIME’s qualitative interviews with key economic and political actors, including design of interviews and survey questionnaires;
- Leading and writing a paper with comparative (cross-country) analysis of the interests of economic and political actors *vis-à-vis* irregular migrants, based on qualitative interviews across five European countries;
- Contributing to other research, policy engagement and dissemination tasks of PRIME as required;
- Participating in regular PRIME and MPC events and activities, including engagement with a range of policy stakeholders.

- Proven expertise, formal training, and experience in comparative legal analyses;

- Proven knowledge of theories relevant to the role of rights in shaping public policies;
- Proven experience with designing, conducting and analysing qualitative interviews with policy elites (incl. trade unions, employer associations and government officials) in different European countries;
- Proven experience with cross-country analysis of the legal rights of irregular migrant workers;
- Excellent team-working and communications skills acquired through previous experience.

#### Desirable:

- Relevant publications in a related field.
- Demonstrated direct experience with policy-making processes in practice.
- Relevant publications in a related field.
